Child Care Need in Utah


- 54% of UT children have both parents, or their only household parent, in the workforce
- 62% of working women have children under age 6
- Nearly 80% of Utah women with young children work
 full- or part-time outside the home at some point
- Utah's birth rate in 2021 was 14.0 per 1,000 Utahns, the lowest birth rate in a decade (it was 18.2 in 2011).



Child Care before COVID

- Families can't afford to pay:
 - Average Annual Cost for Infant Care: \$9,556
 - Average Annual Cost for Toddler Care: \$8,081
- Providers can't afford to stay:
 - Average Annual Provider Wage: \$13.71/hour
 (\$28,520/year)
 - On average, child care providers make <u>less</u> than dog walkers.

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Child Care during COVID

- Federal pandemic/recovery funds: for families
 - Expanded Child Care Assistance Program eligibility
 - Co-payments waived
 - Increased CCAP payments for each child
- Federal pandemic/recovery funds: for child care providers
 - Stabilization grants
 - Regional growth and recruitment
 - Fees, other costs waived



Child Care in Utah Now

Why advocates are ringing alarm bells about Utah's child care industry

Pandemic-era federal grants that helped day care businesses will start to dry up in October, leaving parents to absorb the extra costs.

My Story



SO EXPENSIVE

- 50 bucks
 - Per day
 - Per kid
- 2 kids \$100/day
- 5 days/week = \$500
- 4 weeks/month = \$2,000

More than my mortgage!!

(And Miss Carmen's)

SO CHEAP

~50 bucks/day/kid

10 hours/day = \$5/hour/kid

Up to 16 kids (with 1-3 employees)

Usually fewer (ratio of babies/older kids is unfavorable)

16 kids @ \$5/hr/kid = \$80/hr Up to \$800/day, 4,000/week, 16,000/month

Costs

Wages - \$15/hr - \$6,000/month

Fixed costs, Food, cleaning supplies, maintenance, curriculum, materials, toys, repairs, etc.

Carmen's salary? Training? Professional Development Reinvestment?



Big Ideas

- Employees in Residential zones is often prohibited
 - Realistic expectations
- Cannot exceed 25% of living area is common
 - Might be difficult
- Lot size, fences, traffic patterns, arterial streets
 - Existing homes couldn't be retrofitted to fit requirements
- Permits mostly ok

- Max of 6 kids unless all property owners within 500ft signs an affidavit and these are brought to City Council in support to expansion
- Must live on premise
- Cannot employ anyone who doesn't live there
 - Home Occupation permit must be renewed annually (and does not substitute business license and other license requirements)

- Not required to be residents of the home
- One off street parking space required for each employed caregiver that does not live in the home.
- Must provide a traffic flow and parking plan
- Cannot exceed 25% of the living area
- Must notify by letter all residents within a three hundred foot 300' radius of the property lines of their request for a home occupation license if customers visit the home.
 - The applicant shall provide a legible vicinity map indicating the exact location of their property and each property within 1/4 mile (1,320 feet)...
- Same entrance as home
- Annual renewal for permit

- Minimum Lot size 20k sq. ft
- On and oriented to an arterial or collector street
- All play equipment in backyard with 6 ft fence
 - "At least ten feet (10') from the fence to the interior portion of the property shall be landscaped in such a way that the area cannot be used by the patrons."

- Not allowed in single family residential zones
- Cannot employ anyone who doesn't live there
 - Home occupations in R1-15 on lots of 20,000+ on arterial streets
 - preschools and daycares not allowed in R1-15 zones
- Cannot exceed 25% of the living area
 - Which must include 35 sq ft per child
 - Outdoor play area that is fenced must include 100 sq ft per child
- Must use the same entrance

- Allowed in 1 of 2 residential zones and 1 of 2 commercial zones
- 8 children max including 2 under 2 max
- Annual permit
- Cannot exceed 25% of the living area

- Limited All Day Childare Programs for Workforce Families
- We've Had 2 Childcare Centers Close in the Last 2 Years
- Losing 2.8 Million in Summit County
- Losing \$1.3 Million in Park City
- 2 Main Childcare Centers combined will lose almost \$980K
- Average Waitlist time for a newborn is 18 months
- Average Childcare Cost for 1 child from Birth to Kindergarten about \$100K



Last Year's Childcare Rates

Ages 0-24 months = \$1275 Age 2y = \$1125 Ages 3y-5y = \$925

My Monthly Cost Was= \$2050



NEW Rates in anticipation of Federal Fund Expiration

0-36 Months - \$2000 3/4/5 yr -\$1600


My Monthly Cost = \$3600

Park City Cares About Kids



- \$1MM Childcare Fund
- General funds reserve



- Based on average cost of care at \$1700 a month per child
- 3rd party administrator to verify income and eligibility





- For Park City Residents Scholarship for families with a household income of 100% AMI or less, pay 10% of Income to Childcare
- For Park City Residents Scholarship for families with a household income of 120% AMI or less, pay 12% of Income to Childcare
- For Park City Residents and Workforce in Park City proper \$200 scholarship per month/per child for children under 36 months
- For Childcare Providers DWS Incentive \$300 per month per child for children receiving the DWS stipend
- Park City Municipal Employee Childcare Benefit

Enlisting the State's Partnership

- Create a Child Tax Credit that helps more families with young children
- Continue a revised version of federal Stabilization Grants:
 - Focus on wage supplementation
- Expand regional child care expansion efforts
 - Active recruitment and support
 - Start-up grants, waiving fees
- Child Care Workforce Support
 - Child care coverage for child care professionals
